For two months, children and teachers had to haul five gallon containers of water to the school so children could have a drink at lunch time. Thanks to your donations, a new pipe was run over a half mile to a more reliable water source in order for running water to be restored to the school. The expense was over fifteen hundred dollars. The children drank eagerly as water poured from the tap.

In February, we noticed children sharpening their pencils with razor blades. Thanks to the kindergarten class at the Websterville Baptist Christian School in Vermont and other donors, pencil sharpeners were installed in each classroom during our June Mission Trip. The children in Vermont raised eighty dollars by selling cookies. With the prevalence of AIDS, we are relieved that they no longer need to use the razor blades.

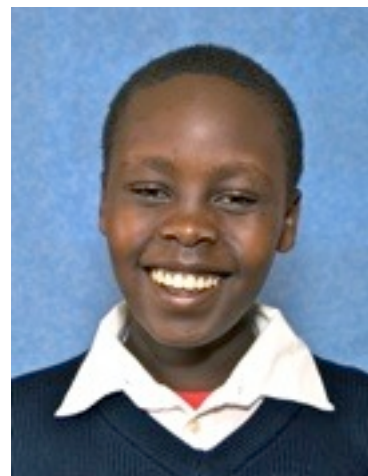

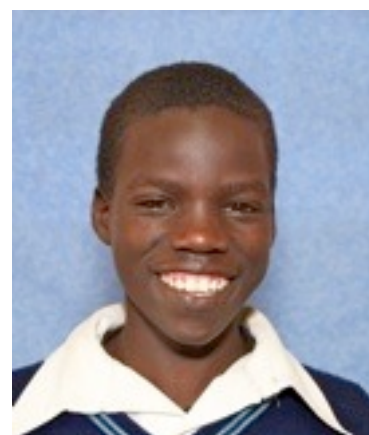

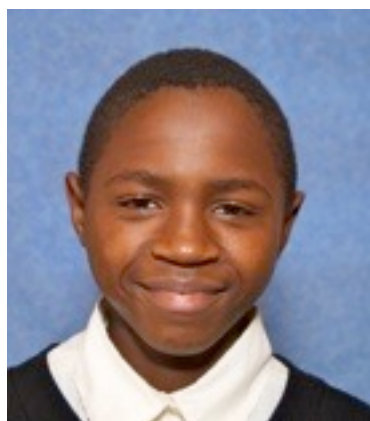
